Story telling



Story character	A character is a person, animal, being, creature, or thing in a story . Examples are hero, heroine, witch, castle, knight, princess, prince, king, queen, frog, giant
Story setting	The time and place where the story is set
Story telling	Enjoying telling, reading or writing stories because there are exciting events that develop the imagination

Will you read me a story?

We all love a good story. In Nursery this half term we are learning stories and songs all about fairy tales. It is so, so important to read to our children, or tell them stories. They develop a rich vocabulary, learn about people and situations, and begin to understand how stories are structured.

Your child should have a book bag from school with a yellow reading record in it, (if not, do let us know) Books get changed regularly, just put a tick or a comment in the book and we'll know to change it.

We don't expect children to be able to read at this age but they can tell you what they think might happen next, who the characters are or even retell the story when you've finished, using the pictures as clues.

It's OK to read the same book twice (or more!) because children like familiarity.
