Our Learning

EYFS have been looking at travel and have learnt about many different ways to travel by playing with themed activities such as boats in the water tray, mark making with pen cars to show the route they have taken and have drawn pictures of aeroplanes, trains and much more. They have talked about speed and sorted vehicles into different types. There is so much to learn about transport! They've spent a lot of time outside exploring the signs of Spring and have helped to dig our garden areas and look at what is growing and living there. EYFS staff are also in the process of creating an outdoor learning room to enjoy as the weather gets warmer, they can't wait to show you the completed room! The children in both classes have returned happy and smiley and are thoroughly enjoying being back with all their friends ©









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GOLDFINCHES have been learning the story of the enormous Turnip. They've created their own storylines following this theme too. They've also been looking at transport like their friends in EYFS and have created a play hot air balloon by recycling a cardboard box! Goldfinches have also investigated shapes and patterns, looking at sequences and creating patterns of their own and took part in a mini project researching the Arctic and the animals that live there. They have also spent a lot of time developing the garden areas outside, where seed balls have started to spring up and revamped the mud kitchen.

ROBINS have loved being back. They have produced a gorgeous lock down poem and loved reading different stories and exploring different texts at the start of this half term. They are now learning and innovating a new story in English lessons called Little Charlie. He goes to take his grandma some food but some scruffy pigeons and other creatures eat it before he gets there! In Maths they have been measuring everything and anything- length, weight, capacity and are now going over some of our basic maths skills- counting in 2s, 5s, 10s exploring number patterns and addition/ subtraction. In knowledge, great discussions have been had to think about what to spend a budget on and the things they would do if they were prime minister. Everyone agreed it is a very tricky job, especially at the moment! Robins have also loved finding out about how to take care of our world. They have joined Ken Hill for assemblies about conservation, have been inspired to do their own litter pick and have started thinking about small changes they can make that can help the world we live in. They have also explored different architectural features of buildings and are lucky to learn in a school with so much history and beautiful features inside and out. Have you ever noticed the two entrances? Separate doors for Boys and Girls! I wonder when they were built.









OWLS have been researching ancient Egyptian art this term and have looked at tomb art, masks and sarcophagus', busts of Pharaohs. They created their own sphinxes and clay beads, and made papyrus paper using glue! In History, Owls learnt about the Romans and their empire, how they had large armies that invaded Britain and went on to build many of our towns. They have spent time in PSHE looking at how to be healthy and have a healthy body, knowing what food helps good health, how to sort foods into correct groups and how and when to use medicines. Maths has had the class looking at fractions, 1/2, 1/3 and ¼ and in English children have been writing their own 'Lesson learnt' stories and learning longer vocabulary such as monumental and hysterically.


Next Half-Term

NEST AND NURSERY will become explorers this term, looking at maps, learning how to hide, really hunting for and finding treasure. They will also look at ladybirds – their life cycle, why they have spots and where they live.

GOLDFINCHES will be looking at Growing and Changing – What do seeds need to grow, why do we grow trees and life cycles. They will also learn about Relationships and feelings.

ROBINS will travel across the seven continents in Geography, learn about plants in Science and talk about and create freestanding structures in Design Technology.

OWLS will be visiting Northern Europe in Geography, researching electricity in Science, discovering how to make music and looking at murals and tapestries in Art.

Family Learning, Norfolk Adult Learning



Norfolk County Council is offering free and fun interactive sessions and courses to Norfolk families with children 0-4 years, taking part together. These are currently delivered online and our dedicated tutors will share hints, tips and tricks for running some great, engaging activities for all the family to enjoy.

Our sessions promote children's learning in all areas of development within in the EYFS, with a greater focus on the Prime Areas. Over the last year, opportunities to support these areas of development have been limited, with families unable to see relatives, meet friends or attend social groups. The contact children have had in the world outside their home environment has been impacted by social distancing and mask-wearing. Developing an understanding of and ability to interact and communicate with others, has been lost. Our sessions compensate for this by exploring activities and opportunities to meet children's needs in these crucial areas of development at a time when they need it most.
